There are, however, some instances where the patients aren't all that impressed. The American Dental Association does not recognize it as a specialty. Therefore, most general dentists practice it as well. Further training isn't necessary, since cosmetic dentistry is very similar to orthodontics.

Even though all dentists learn the basics of cosmetics at dental school, seeking the help of more experienced practitioners is still a much wiser choice when it comes to smile makeovers and other complicated procedures. Doctors often consult this Libertyville dentist, who specializes now in cosmetic procedures, about putting veneers. They're not as trained. How to know a good cosmetic dentist when you see one? Ask about his or her experience and training, and finally ask for proof the work he or she has done in the past. Try to get an eye for what their aesthetic is painstakingly. If all you see are rows of Chiclets teeth, don't trust he'll be able to create the natural looking smile you want.

In order to become full pledge dentists, students must first pass a series of oral and written examinations from the American Academy of Cosmetic Dentistry accreditation system. Referrals may also be present on the Internet, though it will require a bit of searching. In order to be listed, doctors are asked to pay a fee.

Instead of requesting procedures specifically, try to be more lucid about what you want. For example, a patient might ask for veneers, when what she really needs is gum reshaping to correct a gummy smile. The dentist should take time to talk to you about what you'd like to change about your smile and to develop a treatment plan to reach those goals. Before sending a wax model to the laboratory, the patient is first asked if he or she is satisfied with the way his or her new teeth are positioned. There should be no guess work involved here. Patients can only decide on a staged work. Cosmetic dentists would recommend having the teeth whitened prior to the creation of the veneers, so as to match the colors. Similarly, bonding uses that rule. Restorations can't be whitened.

In addition, ask questions about the laboratory that will make your new veneers. Do you think it was not this and a different lab that made the veneers on the photos? With highly skilled lab technicians, you are sure to get natural looking teeth with no issues about color, translucency and contour.

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
