Foley Catheters - Get To Your Health Care Provider For Cash Saving Plans

Catheters can be used in a variety of situations such as short term use after major surgery, a method of monitoring urine for hospitalized patients after a major surgery, or for outpatients getting special care. It's important that you understand each of the types of Catheter Equipment before your hospital visit or buying any supplies.

There are three main urinary catheter types – indwelling, condom, and intermittent. It's important that you learn more about the different types of catheters to reduce many of the short-term problems that you may be faced with.

The indwelling catheter is often very uncomfortable. It is inserted into the bladder through the urethra. This method increases the risk of contracting from a urinary tract infection. This can infection can be extremely painful and unnecessary.

Condom catheters will greatly reduce the risk of urinary tract infection in men by 80% over the indwelling type. Not to mention that the condom type is much more comfortable and offers no pain. The indwelling catheter is inserted into the bladder through the urethra and causes a great amount of discomfort and increases the risk of an infection.

There are some additional Catheter Equipment that you will need along with any type of catheter that you choose to use. Every catheter needs a drainage bag that is attached to hold the urine. A drainage bag needs to be lower than your bladder in order for the urine to drain into the bag. There are two different types of drainage bags – a leg bag and down drain. The leg bag is a small bag that is attached to the leg to be concealed under your pants. A down drain is a larger bag that is used at night. This is often hung on the bed or placed on the floor out of harm's way.

The drainage bag also needs to be cleaned properly. You can clean it by soaking it in vinegar that is diluted in water for 20 minutes. Talk to a medical professional to ensure you are properly cleaning the drainage bag as well as the catheter. It will need to be removed from the catheter and emptied when it is full; often this is every 8 hours to prevent it from going back into the bladder.

Learning more about the different urinary catheter types will allow you to find the best one to suit your needs.
